This is Momma Cat, resting with her sleeping kittens. She was spayed at the Community Cat Complex the day before this picture was taken. I'm not sure who is luckier — Momma Cat, her kittens, or all of us (including you!) who played a role in this picture of contentment. And, all of us — human and feline — can now celebrate that this is her last litter of kittens!

Momma Cat comes to the Community Cat Complex the night before surgery with her kittens. They rest comfortably together that evening, nursing, sleeping, and playing. On the morning of her spay, Momma is carefully taken to the room down the hall for her life-changing surgery. But the kittens, oh, they are lucky, too!

The kittens are bottle-fed throughout the day or maybe introduced to canned kitten food. They are dewormed, given flea preventative, and, if old enough, are given an FVRCP vaccination, the first of their kitten shots. If any medical aliments are discovered, they are addressed at this time.

In the evening, after mom is fully awake after her surgery and after she's had a bite to eat, she is reunited with her kittens. And, yes, this happy picture is replicated again and again throughout the spring and summer kitten season!


